Financials

The year 2010/11 saw total income rise from N\$1,878,894 to N\$ 2,280,208 while expenditure was similar to the previous year at N\$1,818,145. Two major research programmes got underway during the period – in the form the Democracy Report parliamentary monitoring and analysis project funded by the Embassy of Finland and the Freedom House-backed Anti-Corruption Research Programme. During the year under review the IPPR neared the end of its longstanding relationship with the Ford Foundation which had assisted the Institute with core funding since 2001. A final tie-off grant was due to end in August 2011 as the Ford Foundation decided to end its support for projects in Namibia as part of regional re-organisation. Significant project funding was also received from a range of donors and institutions e.g. Embassy of Finland, IDASA, Canadian High Commission, Hanns Seidel Foundation, Dutch Consulate, UNDP, Old Mutual, Nedcapital, Nedbank, Open Budget Index, NID, ILO, GTZ, the Friedrich Ebert Stiftung, and the International Budget Project. Accumulated funds at the end of the 2010/11 financial year stood at N\$ 1,538,943 compared to N\$1,076,879 in the previous financial year.

Staff and administration

The IPPR has, since 2005, adopted a streamlined approach to staffing with just two full-time staff members – an Executive Director and an Office Manager. Since the appointment of Graham Hopwood as Executive Director and Lizaan van Wyk as Office Manager, there have been no staff changes.

The IPPR Board – consisting of Monica Koep as chairperson, Professor André du Pisani, Professor Bill Lindeke, Robin Sherbourne, Daniel Motinga and Graham Hopwood as ex-officio member – with the resignation of Dr Pandu Hailonga van Dijk who relocated abroad. The board met three times in the course of the year. The stability in terms of staff and board members was key in helping the IPPR boost its project work and income.

Sixteen research associates and interns worked with the institute during the year – contributing greatly to the development of the IPPR's research programmes.

As a result of the increased number of research activities, publications and events, the IPPR's media profile rose dramatically

Research Dissemination

The main means of disseminating IPPR research is the Institute's website (www.ippr.org.na), which includes downloadable PDFs of all the research completed since 2001. In 2010/11 most of the research papers were printed as conventional hard copies. The electronic mailing list, which has increased from the 900 recipients in 2010/11 to 1100 individual up-to-date e-mail addresses in the year under review, serves as an important multiplier.

The box below shows that the number of hits received by the IPPR website. The regularly updated IPPR website has become an indispensable resource for a range of people in Namibia, as well as those abroad wanting to find out more about the country (with feedback from users mentioning its accessibility, usefulness and relevance). Website hits increased dramatically from 125,159 to 189,369.

Maintaining visibility
