25 Fact Check pieces and one video were published on key issues in Namibia during the first half of 2023 including on fake recruitment drives at the Electoral Commission of Namibia and the Namibia Statistics Agency, fake competitions at MTC, a fake Samherji apology on Fishrot, an explainer on the right to protest in Namibia, and a review of Namibia's youth unemployment figures.

IPPR events and activities 2023:

February 21 2023 - Namibia's Foreign Policy and Human Rights - Presentation & Panel Discussion. Speakers: Kitty Mcgirr (IPPR research associate), Ambassador Tuliameni Kalomoh (former Assistant UN Secretary-General), Gwen Lister (founder of The Namibian newspaper and veteran journalist), Uendjiundja Black (Social Policy Analyst), Steven Gruzd (South African Institute of International Affairs).

March 6 2023 - The IPPR and CIVIC +264 facilitated a consultation between a visiting team from the International Monetary Fund (IMF) and civil society and development partner representatives. Issues discussed included public debt, corruption, the Basic Income Grant, and green hydrogen proposals.

March 15 2023 - The second edition of Procurement Tracker Namibia for 2023 was launched. The issue looked at strengthening the investigative capacities of the procurement system should be a priority in the light of recent controversies such as the

NSFAF HQ construction. IPPR research associate Frederico Links presented on the theme of publication, while Francois Brandt, head of the Procurement Policy Unit in the Ministry of Finance spoke in response. Venue: House of Democracy.

March 23 2023 - The IPPR's annual national budget review was launched at an event which addressed the topic 'Budget Transparency: Where Are We Now?' IPPR Executive Director Graham Hopwood presented on the theme and Helvi Fillipus, Economic Advisor to the Minister of Finance, spoke in response. Venue: House of Democracy.

April 5 2023 - The IPPR collaborated with CIVIC +264 on organizing a briefing meeting for civil society on green hydrogen developments - with German green hydrogen envoy Rainer Baake and Namibia's Green Hydrogen Commissioner James Mnyupe.

May 10 2023 - The IPPR's Integrity Namibia project held its second regional conference in Gobabis. Speakers included Environmental Commissioner Timo Mufeti, ACC Deputy Director General Erna van der Merwe, Peter Watson and Chloe Brandt from the Legal Assistance Centre, and Rob Parker from the Economic and Social Justice Trust. Gobabis Mayor Melba Tjozongoro opened proceedings. Venue: Goba Lodge, Gobabis.

May 17 2023 - The third edition of Procurement Tracker Namibia for 2023 was launched. The issue looked at concerns arising out of an official report on irregularities at TransNamib and procurement issues raised by the draft local content policy on oil and gas. Frederico Links presented on TransNamib while Graham Hopwood spoke about the local content policy. Venue: House of Democracy.

In addition, between February and May, six focus group discussions were held as part of the Integrity Namibia project with the media, lawyers, youth, private sector, labour, and churches about corruption-related issues.

Speaking engagements/presentations 2023:

January 19 2023 - Graham Hopwood gave a presentation to the NIPDB Policy Advisory Committee on the WEF global competitiveness report.

January 20 2023 - Graham Hopwood spoke at the Landless People's Movement (LPM) leadership consultation meeting on how the oil and gas discoveries can deliver for Namibia.

February 3 2023 - IPPR research associate Kitty Mcgirr addressed the annual conference of LPM elected councillors on local and regional governance risks arising out of the HSF-backed report of 2022.

February 10 2023 - Graham Hopwood facilitated a half-day discussion on media viability in Namibia with the Editors Forum of Namibia.

February 23 2023- Graham Hopwood spoke at a conference on the 30th anniversary of the National Council on the role of the National Council vis-à-vis civil society.

March 1 2023 - IPPR research associate Frederico Links addressed the Countering Transnational Organised Crime in Africa conference which took place in Johannesburg South Africa on the issue of Transnational Corruption in Namibia. The conference was organised by Good Governance Africa and the Attorney General Alliance-Africa.

March 15 2023 - Graham Hopwood addressed the Namibian French Business Association (NFBA) on Namibia - Political Prospects 2023-24.

March 17 2023 - Graham Hopwood addressed the Namibia Institute of Corporate Governance annual conference on the issues of 'Transparency & Whistleblowing'. March 27 2023 - Graham Hopwood addressed a workshop on the Extractive Industries Transparency Initiative at the invitation of the Trade Union Congress of Namibia (TUCNA).

April 26 2023 - Graham Hopwood addressed an Integrity Summit organised by the Office of the Prime Minister (OPM) on the issue of Public Integrity. The summit looked at the role being played by Integrity Committees within the offices, ministries, and agencies of government.

May 16 2023 - Graham Hopwood and Frederico Links spoke at the launch of the EUfunded New Voices, New Narratives project of which the IPPR is a part about the role of the project and the state of civil society.

May 29-June 2 2023 - IPPR research associate Frederico Links participated in a SADC, UN Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC), and Government of Angola conference on combating corruption in Luanda, Angola, held under the theme 'The challenges of regional cooperation in the implementation of the UNCAC'. He gave a presentation on the Namibian CSO perspective. Links was part of the official Namibian delegation led by the Anti-Corruption Commission as UNODC had requested that delegations include a civil society representative.

June 28 2023 - IPPR Research Associate Frederico Links addressed a workshop on 'Assessing Cybersecurity and Digital Surveillance in Botswana,' via an online link. Links gave a regional perspective on the topic of 'Cyber security and the surveillance of citizens, civil society and media: What laws are being passed & why should we pay attention?'. The workshop was organized by international media support organisation InterNews.

June 29 2023 - IPPR Research Associate Frederico Links gave a presentation on 'State surveillance practices and trends across Southern Africa' at a virtual conference organised by MISA Lesotho, Advancing Rights in Southern Africa (ARISA), and InterNews. The conference addressed the topic: "Exploring the exposure of the media and citizens to state surveillance in Southern Africa".

Notable issues:

- *The IPPR continued to be an active member of the UNCAC Coalition Sub-Saharan Africa group and the UNCAC Coalition Asset Recovery Group.
- *The IPPR is a member of the Civil Society EITI Working Group.
- *The IPPR is a member of the Southern African Anti Corruption Network (SAACoN).
- *The IPPR continues to serve as a member of the Cluster 3 group for the National Anti-Corruption Strategy and Action Plan which is coordinated by the Anti-Corruption Commission. Research associate Rosevitha Ndumbu is the IPPR representative.
- *The IPPR continues to serve as a member of the steering committee for the Enhancing Participatory Democracy (EPDN) in Namibia project based at parliament. Research associate Rosevitha Ndumbu is the IPPR representative.
- *IPPR Executive Director Graham Hopwood was elected as the Chairperson of the Civil Society Information Centre (CIVIC +264) for 2023.

*Since September 2022, the IPPR had sold 644 copies of the Guide to the Namibian Economy publication.

The IPPR has so far been unable to locate a new funder for its parliamentary monitoring work that was supported by the Embassy of Finland until the end of 2022. The long-running civil society sustainability project funded by USAID via FHI360 also came to an end in 2022.

Media coverage:
